Shhhh.....! Our Capital Campaign is in its 'Quiet Phase' ... But We Still Want to Tell You About It!

*Branching Out for a Sustainable Future* is a capital campaign to help Camp Kawartha embark on a remarkable journey. With the success of this campaign, it will expand and enhance our award winning summer camp. Our goal is to become a **nationally significant** environmental leadership centre. A place where we can foster environmental citizens.

It is time to replace some of our older buildings as many are coming to the end of their useful life. They are energy inefficient and weren't built for four seasons. This is an opportunity for us to take a leadership role in sustainable design – to showcase the best in sustainable building practices. From constructing the **first example of a certified "living building"** in Canada to demonstrating alternative energy in action, from showing best practices in managing waste to harvesting fresh food straight from our own organic garden; we want visiting children, youth and adults to be activated and empowered. By teaching action skills, leadership skills and nature awareness, we hope to seed the next generation of environmental leaders.

At the same time, **Camp Kawartha is bursting at the seams**. A modest increase in capacity will help us deliver our mission of fostering stewardship to more children, students and adults than ever.

The plan is to secure \$3.5 *million* to make several upgrades to our systems, our layout, and our buildings which will help grow our capacity. Our upgrade plans include:

### Central Hub Addition and Renovation (\$2,537,000)

Our current dining hall was built in the 1960's. It's poorly insulated and sits on piers. The plan is to remove the current hall and replace it with a "central hub" consisting of a dining hall and sleeping quarters, all demonstrating the **latest in green architecture**. This certified "living building," would be the first of its kind in all of Canada. From straw-bale construction to rainwater collection, from geothermal and compost heating, to all natural materials; the central hub would be designated as a net zero building (zero toxins, zero waste and zero carbon), a national showpiece for sustainability. Accommodations added at the back of the new hall will **improve accessibility** for those with limited mobility. In addition, our Health Centre will be moved into the hub so that it can more effectively look after the needs of visitors. This innovative renovation will allow Camp Kawartha to modestly increase its

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#### Greening of Infrastructure (Waste Water Management Upgrade - \$536,000)

The current septic system was constructed in 1985 and designed to accommodate 125 campers. Most septic systems last 20 to 25 years and Camp Kawartha is nearing the end of the life cycle. This is an opportunity to redevelop our waste management system using the latest green technologies, with the possibility of including a wetland treatment system. The intent is to showcase to campers, teachers, students, parents and visitors how to responsibly deal with human waste.

#### **Reclaiming Green Space** (\$419,000)

We will remove part of our parking lot to create a **large organic food garden** and we'll move the parking lot to another location nearer the road. The redevelopment of that space will allow us to re-green a central portion of the Camp. This reclaimed green space and garden will not only supply the kitchen with fresh produce but will also serve as an important teaching tool for helping visitors to understand the im-



portance of healthy, local food. We also plan to **relocate the Maintenance Department** to a less intrusive place on camp, repurposing this building into space for summer camp and outdoor education programming. This will enhance the delivery of our award winning programming and limit the amount of traffic moving through this central location.

As our alumni, we will be looking to you for support in helping us move this campaign forward. In the coming months, we will be reaching out to you through phone calls and emails to give you more information as we progress. There will also be an exciting announcement made at the reunion for alumni in regards to the campaign. You won't want to miss it!

## **One Step Closer to Accessibility**

Two years ago we reported on the joining of the Oak and IODE cabins in the East Cluster. These are connected by a large deck, with wide ramps and have rooms that make it possible for people with accessibility concerns to fully participate in the overnight cabin experience.



Since then, Camp Kawartha continues to work hard to improve accessibility for all of its



users and break down barriers to enjoying the outdoors and all the aspect of our facilities.

With funding assistance from the Rick Hansen and J.P. Bickell Foundations, we were able to create an accessible pathway that weaves its way to the campfire circle as well as the swimming and boating areas. Now, users with mobility issues such as walkers or wheelchairs

can access our beautiful lake.

The new climbing wall features 'bump-outs', so a climber must negotiate uneven space, creating a greater challenge. It also has three routes allowing more people to climb at once and a new cargo net and hanging ladders to test balance and hand-eye coordination. On top of all these great features, the most exciting part is that our new wall is accessible to those people with physical disabilities, including those in wheelchairs or in use of prosthetics. Our climbing wall is unique to the region, and opens up greater possibilities for individuals and groups.
